The U.S. Department of Education (Department) is committed to supporting our nation's students and institutions of higher education (IHEs) with the \$39.6 billion provided through the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act's Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF). These funds support students and institutions towards recovery efforts so that we can emerge from this pandemic even stronger.

Today, the Department is making available approximately \$36 billion in emergency aid to public and private nonprofit institutions and \$396 million to students at proprietary institutions. These funds – available to over 5,000 IHEs – more than double the emergency relief aid available to students and institutions already authorized under the Coronavirus Aide, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA) relief legislation. Unlike the funds available to proprietary institutions under the CARES Act, the only allowable use of funds for the grants provided under section 314(a)(4) of the CRRSAA is to provide financial aid grants to students, which may be used for any component of the student's cost of attendance or for emergency costs that arise due to coronavirus, such as tuition, food, housing, health care (including mental health care) or childcare. If an institution obtains a student's written (or electronic), affirmative consent, an institution is permitted to apply these grants directly to the student's institutional account; however, students must be informed that they retain the option to receive a direct disbursement of the financial aid grant and that an institution may not require that the grant be applied to the student's account.

The ARP requires that institutions prioritize students with exceptional need, such as students who receive Pell Grants or undergraduates with extraordinary financial circumstances. Institutions are expected to establish a transparent process for assessing need. Universal Healthcare Careers College signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has used, or intends to use, 100% percent of the funds received under Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

1. The total amount of funds that the institution has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement [for] Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students is \$61,554 to be distributed to eligible students in equitable sums.
2. The estimated total number of students at the institution eligible to participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under ARP is approximately 80 students.
3. The total number of students who have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under ARP is 82 total students from all eligible programs.
4. The method(s) used by the institution to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they would receive under ARP. The school utilized the 2019-2020 & 2020-2021 Financial Aid award as a guide to determine the funding amount and ensure as wide distribution to students as possible. Adhering to this formula, UHCC used this formula as a guide for none Title IV students.
5. Students need not apply for the HEERF monies. All students who are eligible automatically qualify. Students will be contacted and scheduled individually to come in and pick up the check and sign documents.
